Renowned poet Mirza Ghalib also wrote in Rekhta, which came to be known as Urdu in the late 19th Century. And this is the language that the popular festival, Jashn-e-Rekhta, is devoted to.

"Urdu is a language of love. There is no scope of any religion or small-mindedness in the language itself," shares Huma Khalil, trustee, Rekhta Foundation, adding, "The 45 sessions this year will cover all aspects of Urdu language and allow those with a hectic life, especially the youngsters, to let their hair down and feel alive."

Not just panel discussions, but almost every possible form of art and culture will be celebrated through this multi-hued event, starting from ghazal, qawwali and Sufi music to dastangoi, poetry and food!

Mahmood Farooqui, writerdirector-dastango, who will present Dastan-e-Meer, says,

"This dastan celebrates 300 years of Meer Taqi Meer, who was one of the biggest poets of 18th Century.... Even today, those who don't know Meer know his phrases such as 'Jaan hai toh jahaan hai'. That's how relevant this poet is and will always to "
